3/8/2022 PUBLIC NOTICE OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO RHODE ISLAND MEDICAID STATE PLAN

In accordance Rhode Island General Laws 42-35, notice is hereby given that the Executive Office of Health and Human Services (EOHHS) proposes to make the following amendment to the Rhode Island State Plan under Title XIX of the Social Security Act:

BHDDH Staffing Waiver

EOHHS is seeking approval from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) of an 1135 Disaster State Plan Amendment (SPA) to update Rhode Island's Medicaid State Plan to allow for typically bundled services provided under Assertive Community Treatment (ACT), Intensive Health Home (IHH), OTP Health Homes, Mental Health Program Rehabilitative Residential (MHPRR), and Acute Stabilization Unit to be billed even if the services are staffed differently than outlined in the current state plan in order to respond to staffing shortages. This SPA is being submitted through an 1135 Disaster Template and only pages 1 and 5 of the template have content for this SPA while the rest is blank intentionally.

The proposed effective date of these changes is November 1, 2021, and the changes will only be effective until the end of the Public Health Emergency (PHE). No fiscal impact is anticipated.

In accordance with the Rhode Island General Laws 42-35-3, an oral hearing will be granted on the proposed State Plan Amendment if requested by twenty-five (25) persons, an agency, or by an association having at least twenty-five (25) members. A request for an oral hearing must be made within ten (10) days of this notice.

Section 7 – General Provisions 7.4. Medicaid Disaster Relief for the COVID-19 National Emergency

On March 13, 2020, the President of the United States issued a proclamation that the COVID-19 outbreak in the United States constitutes a national emergency by the authorities vested in him by the Constitution and the laws of the United States, including sections 201 and 301 of the National Emergencies Act (50 U.S.C. 1601 et seq.), and consistent with section 1135 of the Social Security Act (Act). On March 13, 2020, pursuant to section 1135(b) of the Act, the Secretary of the United States Department of Health and Human Services invoked his authority to waive or modify certain requirements of titles XVIII, XIX, and XXI of the Act as a result of the consequences COVID-19 pandemic, to the extent necessary, as determined by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), to ensure that sufficient health care items and services are available to meet the needs of individuals enrolled in the respective programs and to ensure that health care providers that furnish such items and services in good faith, but are unable to comply with one or more of such requirements as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, may be reimbursed for such items and services and exempted from sanctions for such noncompliance, absent any determination of fraud or abuse. This authority took effect as of 6PM Eastern Standard Time on March 15, 2020, with a retroactive effective date of March 1, 2020. The emergency period will terminate, and waivers will no longer be available, upon termination of the public health emergency, including any extensions.

The State Medicaid agency (agency) seeks to implement the policies and procedures described below, which are different than the policies and procedures otherwise applied under the Medicaid state plan, during the period of the Presidential and Secretarial emergency declarations related to the COVID-19 outbreak (or any renewals thereof), or for any shorter period described below:

November 1, 2021 through end of the PHE.

Rhode Island's State Plan offers bundled rates for each of these listed services, which are based in part on certain staffing minimums. Rhode Island is seeking to amend the State Plan to temporarily allow payment of these rates even if the services are staffed differently, as described below.

Rhode Island proposes to temporarily allow current rates to be paid if Licensed Practice Nurses (LPN) and Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRN) (i.e., Psychiatric and Mental Health Nurse, Psychiatric Clinical Nurse Specialist (PCNS), Nurse Practitioner) are deployed in place of Registered Nurses and psychiatrists, respectively.

The Provider approval process shall be on a provider-by-provider basis. The single state Medicaid agency shall require the licensing agency to review and approve of the utilization of

LPNs and APRNs within their respective scopes of practice. LPNs shall be supervised by a Registered Nurse, and APRNs shall consult with a physician, as required under Rhode Island professional licensing standards.

The licensing agency shall document that each provider has made reasonable efforts to hire certain professional staff for the same billing period in question, that despite these reasonable efforts they were unable to file the position, and that the substitution of professional staff is necessary to ensure the provision of services and the health and safety of eligible Medicaid beneficiaries. Specifically, each provider shall document one (1) month of aggressive recruitment of RNs and/or psychiatrists, as applicable. The licensing agency shall document each provider's approved professional substitution.
